

Mrs [REDACTED] approached me in mid 1985 saying that she was concerned about reports that several parents had made to her concerning the sexual overtones of Bro Gregory's conversations and activities.

She cited two examples reported to her:-

- a) In Drama: a young girl reportedly was asked to pretend that she was putting on her stockings and that she boy was noticed sleeping in. "I'll be the boy" Bro Gregory is reported to have said.
- b) In Language: a word game was being played. a number of letters were scattered around. Bro Gregory is reported to have formed a 'four letter' word in front of a girl then quickly scattered the letters after a remark "oops".

Mrs [REDACTED] claimed there was a group of mothers who were concerned by numerous 'sexually overtones' incidents.

I instructed Mrs [REDACTED] that the mothers concerned be requested to come to me to register a complaint - being sure of their facts.

No mothers came!

Mrs [REDACTED] claimed that her daughter [REDACTED] and [REDACTED] had experienced some such 'harassment'. I questioned both girls. Both told me that nothing Bro Gregory had said or done had caused them offence or concern. They enjoyed his class.

Mrs [REDACTED] claims had been passed on.

A number of 6th grade boys and girls had been meeting after school in the Sports Room to kiss one another.

Brother Gregory learnt of this activity from one of the students involved whilst visiting the student's home.

Bro is reported to have encountered two of the children involved in the playground and remarked "I know what you've been doing. Don't get caught again."

No investigations were made. He did not report the incident to the 6th Grade teachers nor any member of the executive.

Miss REDAC learnt of the incidents and the action of Bro from a REDA boy at the Sydney Camp, where the events had been passed around.

I interviewed the children involved. They were surprised that no interviews had followed their actions.

Ms O'Grady instructed staff at a subsequent staff meeting that all such incidents be reported promptly to the Executive.
