He never told us because he thought we would not believe him. We now know why BTM behaved as he did. I have reported the matter as been interviewed. I hope I never meet face to face with that man, as I fear that ~~and~~ <sup>although</sup> aged 77, and with a heart problem, that I would attempt to release my considerable anger against him. Enquiries revealed there had been other complaints about him, but not in his withdrawal from Parish duties. Hopefully if that has not now been done, it soon will be. I intend to follow it up. So you see Father there are very sound reasons to explain my feeling.
