	In response to your memorandum regarding the matter concerning ARH , I offer the following comments:	
	I first became aware of the bond between ASW in Year 7 and ARH at the Year 7 Camp at Yarramundi. Although ARH vas not directly involved with Year 7 in any way, his offer of assistance to attend camp for three days was appreciated, as we were short of staff needed to cover the week long camp. I prepared bus lists and ARH requested to travel on a specific bus. My perception is that this was because ASW was also on this bus. They did sit together.	
	• ASW was unwell (severe headaches) and therefore did not actively take part in the activities. Consequently, rather than mingle with the other boys, he tended to stand alone and it was during these times I noticed a close bond developing between ASW and ARH. I must point out that ASW often linked up with ARH on his own accord, particularly during morning and afternoon tea breaks. There clearly was a dependency with AS and ARH. AS continued to feel unwell and it was decided, in consultation with his parents, to send him home on Tuesday lunchtime.  ARH also left this day and I feel that this was another reason why AS felt he wanted to go home. REDACTE dropped off ASW at School during midafternoon Tuesday; ARH, Bronwyn Steele and me returned in the evening with Rex Ward.	
	During the camp I noticed the bond between ASW and ARH but contact was certainly out in the open.	
	I assumed ARH and ASW had made contact at camp but ASWs father informed me that ARH had me ASW parlier in the term around the Reid House locker area. Each morning there would be a conversation between ASW and ARH ASY assumed ARH vas on locker duty or was the housemaster and began feeling concerned when he realised that there was no direct link between MrARH and his son.	
	My own observation is that there is certainly a strong bond between ASW  ARH MrASY does say that he believes this has helped ASW become  happier at School but he is obviously concerned with the long-term ramifications.  Certainly, we must be sensitive to AS in this situation. A total break in contact could be very difficult and may cause tension within the family and with AS happiness here at School.	
•	Finally, I conclude by saying that I find it very difficult writing on a close colleague in this way. However, my responsibility is first and foremost to the boys in Year 7, in this case ASW I feel torn between understanding ARH 's desire to be a caring member of staff to the boys but yet the desire to establish a very dependent type relationship which is clearly not in the best interests for ARH or ASW
