

1. Are there dangers in "building people up" through pastoral care ?
2. What are the dangers in telling someone "they are special " ?
3. Under what circumstances would it be safe, in providing pastoral care, to:
  - a) say to someone that "you loved them", or to send them affectionate cards, or flowers, or other gifts ?
  - b) hug, or kiss, or otherwise touch someone ?
  - c) talk about sexuality – under the guise of therapy or counselling ?
  - d) volunteer to give evidence in a child custody battle ?
  - e) volunteer to give evidence on behalf of one spouse against another ?
  - f) go outside guidelines for the amount of financial assistance given to a welfare client under the guise of special pastoral care ?
  - g) attempt mediation – particularly if you have had greater contact with one party more than the other, or had already alienated one party ?
4. How would you go about providing pastoral care to :
  - a) an officer accused of assaulting or abusing their own child ?
  - b) the child ?
  - c) the other spouse ?
  - d) an officer who failed to stay within boundaries – and is accused of abuse or assault of a welfare client, or someone else associated with the Army ?
5. How should you react when admissions of unlawful behaviour are about to be made to you, when providing pastoral care ?
